Literary Theory and Criticism: An Introduction provides an accessible overview of major figures and movements in literary theory and criticism from antiquity to the twenty-first century. The book also includes periodic "running" references to selected key titles (such as *Frankenstein*) in order to illustrate the effect of different theories on a single work.
